Lassen County is a rural county in Northern California. Even though Lassen County is the 8th largest county in California it has a relatively small population of roughly 35,000 people, with an incarcerated population of about 10,000.

Identification of a problem

The Opioid epidemic is leaving no community untouched. In 2015, Lassen County had prescribed enough opioids to keep every man, woman, and child medicated around the clock for 15 weeks each year.



In April of 2015, a local physician was charged with misprescribing opioids

Set up distribution sites throughout Lassen County




Distributed 150 kits to distribution centers and community members

- Fear of diversion
- Fear of coercion/ victimization of other IMs
- Manipulation
- Increase in drug seekers
- UAs to determine drug use (Meth vs Heroin)
- Provider Education focused on custody setting
- Cost of Product
